Guidelines for the Evaluation of Projects

1. PROJECT EVALUATION

- 1. Evaluation of the Project Report shall be done under Mark System.
- 2. The evaluation of the project will be done at two stages :
 - a) Internal Assessment (supervising teachers will assess the project and award internal Marks)
 - b) External evaluation (external examiner appointed by the University)
 - c) Grade for the project will be awarded to candidates, combining the internal and external marks.
- 3. The internal to external comonents is to be taken in the ratio 1:4. Assessment of different components may be taken as below.

- 4. External Examiners will be appointed by the University from the list of VI Semester Board of Examiners in consultation with the Chairperson of the Board.
- 5. The Chairman of the VI semester examination should form and coordinate the evaluation teams and their work.
- 6. Internal Assessment should be completed 2 weeks before the last working day of VI Semester.
- 7. Internal Assessment marks should be published in the Department.
- 8. In the case of Courses with practical examination, project evaluation shall be done along with practical examinations.
- 9. The Chairman Board of Examinations, may at his discretion, on urgent requirements, make certain exception in the guidelines for the smooth conduct of the evaluation of project.

2. PASS CONDITIONS

- Submission of the Project Report and presence of the student for viva are compulsory for internal evaluation. No marks shall be awarded to a candidate if she/ he fails to submit the Project Report for external evaluation.
- The student should get a minimum P Grade in aggregate of External and Internal.
- There shall be no improvement chance for the Marks obtaind in the Project Report.
- * In the extent of student failing to obtain a minimum of Pass Grade, the project work may be re-done and a new Internal mark may be submitted by the Parent Department. External examination may be conducted along with the subsequent batch.

STUDY TOUR

Conduct a study tour in to the historically and culturally well-known places in Kerala and India.

GUIDELINES FOR PROJECT REPORT

- 1. Project work shall be done either individually or as a group of students not exceeding three in number in printed/written or electronic formats with prior permission of the Supervisor.
- 2. Each student shall do only one Project either in Arabic or Islamic History. The student can apply for Project allotment in Arabic or Islamic History.
- 3. The students shall be distributed equally in Arabic and Islamic History.
- 4. The students' allotment shall be based upon their published semester marks and overall performance.
- 5. Students should be properly oriented on the methodology of conducting a study during V Semester, making use of the hours allotted for the purpose.
- 6. The Project work should be completed by the end of the VI semester and the report should be submitted by each student to the Department before the examination of VI Semester.

- 7. Length of the printed project report shall be 25 to 35 pages
- 8. The evaluation of the Project will be done at two stages:
 - a. Internal evaluation: (supervising teachers will assess the project and award grades)
 - b. External evaluation: (The team will comprise of an external examiner appointed by the University and the HOD of the institution concerned or his nominee) The team will award Team Grade. A Viva voce related to the project work will also be conducted by the external Evaluation team. All candidates should undergo the Viva voce test individually.
- 9. Grades will be awarded to candidates combining the internal grade, team grade and Viva voce grade.
- 10. Project evaluation and the Viva voce should be conducted immediately after the completion of the regular classes /written examination.
- 11. The chairman of the VI semester exam should form and coordinate the evaluation teams and their work.
- 12. The project external evaluation should be completed before the commencement of the centralized valuation
- 13. External Examiners will be appointed by the University from the list of VI semester Board of Examiners in consultation with the Chairman of the Board

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SOCIAL SERVICE PROGRAMME (CUSSP)

In this programme, a student has to complete 12 days of social service. This has to be completed in the first four semesters; 3 days in each semester. For the regular programme the student has to work in a Panchayath or Local body or in a hospital/poor home or old age home or in a Pain & palliative centre or any social work assigned by the College authorities. Students who engaged in College Union activities and participate in sports and cultural activities in Zonal level have to undergo only 6 days of CUSSP during the entire programme. The whole documents regarding the student should be kept in the college and the Principal should give a certificate for the same. The list of students (successfully completed the programme) must be sent to the university before the commencement of the fifth semester examinations. A college level co-ordinator and a department level co-ordinator shall be appointed for the smooth conduct of the programme.

AUDIT COURSES/ABILITY ENHANCEMENT COURSES

These are courses which are mandatory for a programme but not counted for the calculation of SGPA or CGPA. There shall be one Audit course each in the first four semesters. These courses are not meant for class room study. The students can attain only pass (Grade P) for these courses. At the end of each semester, there shall be examination conducted by the college from a pool of questions (Question Bank) set by the University. The Question paper shall be of 100 marks of 3 hour duration. The students can also attain these credits through online courses like SWAYAM, MOOC etc (optional). The list of passed students must be sent to the University from the colleges at least before the fifth semester examination. The lists of courses in each semester with credits are given below.

An Introduction to the Course

This course gives students an insight to the administrative and cultural history of Muslims right from the period of Prophet Muhammad till modern times. It includes the history of Caliphates, Empires, Movements and different thought streams emerged among Muslims redefining the course of Human history. It deals with history of civilizations, learning, cultural and political contacts with contemporary regimes across the planet. The scope of Islamic History as a multi-disciplinary science is an area of significance in modern times especially in the history of East/Orient and Asian studies. It includes the range of foundational documents, traditions, institutions and history of Muslims throughout the world.

The course begins with an introduction to medieval India, its political reshaping and cultural developments to give the students an outlook on the Muslim societies in medieval India. Later, it develops to the history of Islam during the period of Prophet Muhammad and Pious Caliphates. The Political and Cultural history of Umayyads, Abbasids, Ottoman Empire and other petty Kingdoms will give the students a detailed view of the history of Islam beyond its borders of Middle East and Arab land. The students will also be given a holistic view of Modern Arab World and history of Muslims in Modern India. The paper on research methodology prepares the student to nurture a research attitude in him and make him able to pursue the UG research project effectively.
